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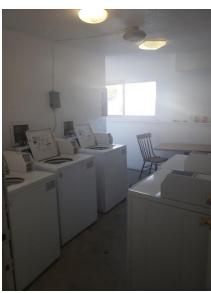

Poplar Place is a spacious, 39-unit, all-electric apartment complex with a dedicated office located in the Central Core area of Olathe, Kansas. Located in an Opportunity Zone, the subject property contains a total of five 2.5-story walk-up apartment buildings (400, 403, 404, 407, 408). The **Opportunity Zones program** provides tax incentives for investors to re-invest their unrealized capital gains into Opportunity Funds that are dedicated to investing into Opportunity Zones (designated by the chief executives of every U.S. state and territory). Residents of Poplar Place have access to 73 off-street parking spaces and are provided with two laundry care centers in Building 400 and Building 403. Building 400's laundry room has three coin operated washers and dryers, and Building 403 has two coin operated washers and dryers. Poplar Place consist of 1 studio unit with an approximate unit size of 395 square feet, 24 one-bedroom units with an approximate unit size of 583 square feet, and 14 two-bedroom units with an approximate unit size of 627 square feet. A onebedroom unit in Building 403 was converted to a dedicated management office, and possesses the potential to be converted back to its original use as a rentable unit. In October of 2018, the roofs on 4 of the 5 buildings were replaced (Building 404's roof not replaced).

Units at the complex feature carpet and vinyl tile flooring, many windows with excellent natural light, Google Fiber, fully equipped kitchens with dishwashers, walk-in closets, through-the-wall A/C units, baseboard heat, and balconies. The one-bedroom units have wood-framed decks that are accessed via sliding glass doors. Along with the through-thewall A/C units, two-bedroom units also have baseboard heat. The units are separately metered for electric and each unit possesses individual hot water heaters. Tenants are responsible for their own electricity and the owner provides water, sewer and trash. The current owner of the subject property, Johnson County Housing Coalition, operates as a private, non-profit equal housing provider. Their mission is "to provide increased opportunities for decent, safe, affordable, accessible permanent housing and support services within Johnson County for people who have limited resources, including people with special needs." The model is to provide housing in Johnson County at below market rates and to rent to individuals and families that might not be able to rent through traditional housing options. Poplar Place's rents are typically 15% to 25% below current market rates, leaving new ownership strong upside and reposition potential. The complex is ideally located just blocks north of the Kansas School for the Deaf, Olathe City Council, Olathe Public Library and the Johnson County District Courthouse, and in one of the most prosperous counties in the country, Johnson County.

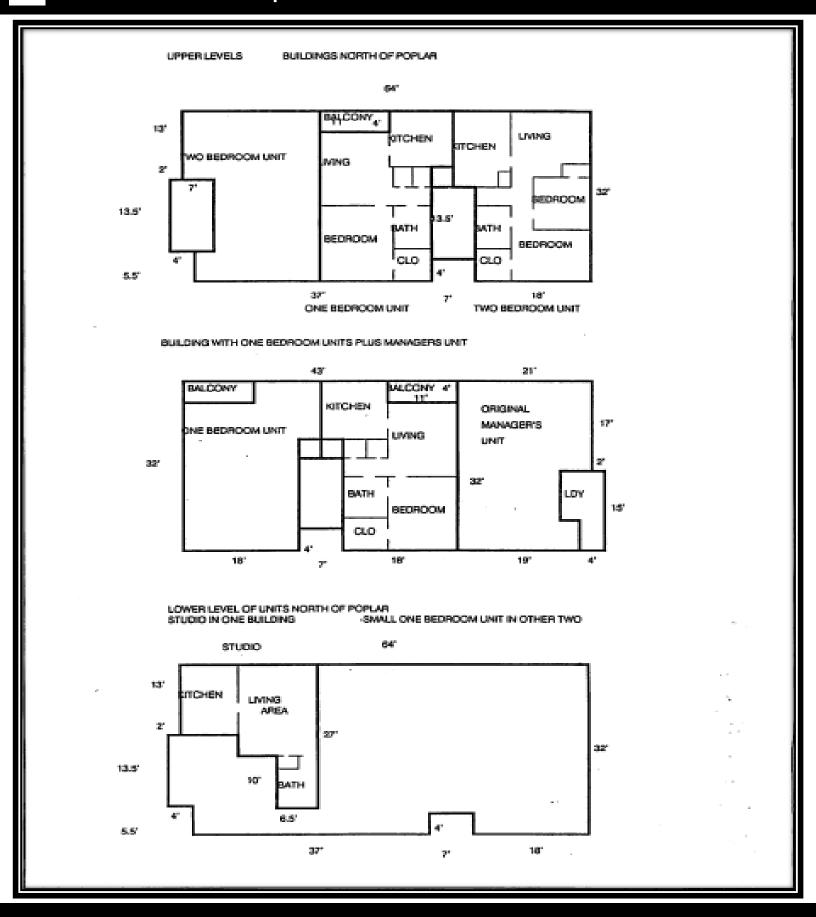

Neighborhood & Submarket Summary

Poplar Place is located in the Central Core neighborhood of Olathe, Kansas, 2blocks west of Olathe City Hall. Olathe, the county seat of Johnson County, Kansas, is located approximately 25 miles southwest of downtown Kansas City, Missouri on Interstate 35 at the junction of U.S. 56 and 169 Highways and Kansas State Highways 7 and 150. Olathe, with a population of approximately 130,000, is the seventh largest city in Kansas and is one of the states most rapidly growing communities. The city is seeing explosive growth with new development and extensive redevelopment throughout the area. Starting in July of 2018, construction began on the new \$193 million Johnson County Courthouse and the project is set to be completed by late 2020 with a move-in date of early 2021. The new courthouse, located 1-block east of Poplar Place and directly next to the old courthouse, will include 28-36 courtrooms and is being built specifically with attorney and judge needs in mind. The old courthouse will be converted to a public green space and the building will be torn down. This event features live music, shopping discounts and fun activities for all ages.

The General Motors Fairfax facility in Kansas City, Kansas is ranked as the most productive auto assembly plant in North America (HARGOUR CONSULTING REPORT). The recently expanded Ford Motor assembly plant in Kansas City builds the popular F- 150 pickup truck and the Hybrid, Ford Escape. Kansas City also has a large Harley Davidson assembly plant near the airport. Kansas City is the second largest U.S. railroad hub in terms of volume (measured in units) and the biggest in terms of tonnage. The area is also home to YRC Worldwide, the largest trucking company in the nation.
